We are pleased to announce that *Folklore* is available in JSTOR, the not-for-profit online digital archive. Users are able to search, browse, view, and print the full-text PDF versions of articles in the journal, from its first issue in 1890 up until and excluding the most recent five years. The backrun accessible in JSTOR also features all issues of *Folklore's* previous titles including *The Folk-lore Record* (1878-1882), *The Folk-lore Journal* (1883-1889), and *Archaeological Review* (1888-1890).

Folklore is available to users at institutions that participate in JSTOR's Arts & Sciences III Collection. This collection contains over 120 titles, and offers a variety of journals in new disciplines including Art & Art History, Art & Architecture, Cultural Studies, Film, Folklore, Performing Arts, and Religion. Other Folklore titles currently available in JSTOR include *Asian Folklore Studies*, *Journal of American Folklore*, *Ricerca Folklorica*, and *Western Folklore*, with plans to add more in the future.
